Course Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Practice dramaturgical text analysis and research techniques
- 2. Integrate image and language-based research to create an artistic vision
- 3. Apply principles of composition when staging actors in a variety of theatre spaces
- 4. Exhibit an understanding of basic cinematography techniques when staging actors for narrative film
- 5. Demonstrate an understanding of the production process by creating film and theatre production schedules
- 6. Collaborate and support actors and other colleagues throughout the production process
- 7. Critique their own work as well as the work of their peers with a focus on identifying the director's level of success in achieving their intended goal

Course Outline:

Introduction to Dramaturgical Script Analysis (approximately one week)

- Reviewing components of scene analysis including the identification of given circumstances, objectives, actions, obstacles, and character relationships
- Evaluating the play/film as a whole including the identification of thematic and structural elements
- Exploring both image and language-based research techniques
- Applying analysis to the creation of a cohesive artistic vision

Introduction to the Critical Response (approximately one week)

- Exploring the benefits of purpose-centered critique
- Accepting the critiques of peers
- Understanding the value of specificity
- Considering artist's intent and the way in which individuals' diverse perspectives affect opinion

Collaborative Practice: Introduction to Theatrical Directing (approximately four to five weeks)

- Exploring theatre spaces, composition, and staging actors
- Creating a production schedule
- Working with actors
- Working with designers and other colleagues
- Practical application scene work

Collaborative Practice: Introduction to Directing Narrative Film (approximately four to five weeks)

- Exploring cinematography in narrative film
- Creating a production schedule
- Working with actors
- Working with cinematographers and other colleagues
- Practical application creation of a short narrative film
